

The crops we grow are the community projects of each year's graduating class. Past projects include the Downtown Revitalization 1983 & 1990, Old Settler's Day 1986, Historic Preservation 1995, Lake Salinda Improvements 1999, Friend of Beck's Mill 2005, Community Fitness Park 2014, and Lighting the Path 2015.

The harvest we spread throughout the community is our graduates as servant leaders. The skills they have learned support them in their current pursuits and help them with future ones. You can see our graduates and alumni as educators in our 3 county school systems; serving the community as law enforcement, dispatchers, and firefighters; leading our local non-profits - YMCA, CAST, Special Olympics; and many others. AWC is involved in nearly every non-profit group in Washington County, and we are so proud of our over 700 + alumni!

Awareness Washington County's community leadership program provides a framework for developing leadership skills, promotes an awareness of Washington County history and its strengths and issues, and commits to servant leadership.
